UNUSUAL BANKSIA PRAEMORSA?

At our December Xmas break-up Margaret showed me some photos of the development of a flower. I found it quite interesting and asked her to tell us about it ...



Margaret writes ... This Banksia praemorsa seedling was an odd looking one that came up amongst John Mahoney's thousands of seedlings. John planted one in his own garden. He thought it might be one of the "Hot

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Pink" flowered forms. He gave me cutting material and I managed to get two to strike. My plant is now about 4m high and certainly unusual with its colour changes. Someone entered a similar form in our photo competition. 




EUCALYPTUS TUCKER

I work at Werribee Zoo, driving the Safari busses. One of the things I talk about on my tours is the fencing that the works staff have done to protect the Eucalypts from being decimated by our five giraffe boys.

One guest said they understood that only koalas can eat and digest Eucalyptus leaves, because of the toxins contained therein. Not so. Giraffe love them.



As the photo shows, Harold the giraffe is stretching hard to reach the closest leaves, pressing himself so hard against the wire that he has a black mark across his chest where it rubs.

Armani, our tallest giraffe at 5.5 metres can reach these leaves because of his superior height, and his 30cm tongue! The others have to wait for the leaves to grow a bit, or until it rains and the weight of the water causes them to droop a little lower.

The zoo grows onsite almost all of the leaves that are fed out to the animals. A new plantation was started last year and once this has grown enough to be harvested, we should be self-sufficient for browse.

We grow ten species that are used to feed the Koalas, and other browsers, and they are rotated every couple of days to keep the animals from getting bored. The keepers put in a request each day for the Horticulture team to harvest what is needed.
