LIVERWORTS - Ade Foster

A few months back Chris Walker-Cook posed a question about Liverworts in the garden and what members feel about them. Do we leave them, or do we remove them as most are introduced species. I had a message from Lyhn Barfield with this great photo.

Lyhn volunteers at the Queenscliff Indigenous Nursery, and one of her tasks is to remove the Liverwort that may form in the soil of the tubestock.



A liverwort is a flowerless, spore-producing plant - with the spores produced in small capsules. They don't have flowers, but rather male and female reproductive structures called sporocarps.

The male sporocarps – Antheridiophores - look like an umbrella while the female achegoniophores have finger-like projections. Lyhn's photo is of the female achegoniophores.

Liverworts have flattened, ground-hugging, leaf-like structures called the thallus. These were thought to look like the lobes of a liver. Wort is an old English word for a small plant. Hence the name.

Liverworts are not really a problem in the garden, and some folks encourage them in pots to give a certain aesthetic. They possibly indicate an acidic soil. They can compete with young plants for nutrients. So to kepp or not to keep? Entirely up to you.
