# FEBRUARY MEETING - GENERAL MATTERS

The meeting was chaired by Bruce McGuiness.

# FEBRUARY MEETING PRESENTATION BY BELLARINE LANDCARE

Sophie Small from Bellarine Landcare spoke on the topic of Bellarine Landcare's role in restoration of the Bellarine landscape and how we as Australian native gardeners can directly help this effort.

Landcare as an organisation came out of a grass-roots movement of farmers and others concerned about the degradation and increased salinity of farming land across Australia in the 1980's. Formally established in 1989 there are now around 6000 groups responding to local ecological issues across Australia, working to build resilient ecosystems. Bellarine Landcare is our local Landcare Group. A key local issue on the Bellarine is habitat loss. Across Geelong and the Bellarine Peninsula only around 5% of pre-European local native vegetation remains. To help to address this the Bellarine Landcare Nursery was opened around two decades ago. The nursery propagates then sells plants that are indigenous to the Bellarine region at all the different "layers" including trees, shrubs and groundcovers along with native grasses, creepers and herbs. Sophie talked the group through how the nursery works with gardeners and landscapers to get these plants back into the local landscape. Her passion and enthusiasm was as inspiring as her talk was informative.

The Bellarine Landcare Nursery has developed two free booklets that introduce gardeners to appropriate local plants to acquire by categorising them as:

- Bird attracting (habitat and/or food)
- Insect or butterfly attracting
- Listed as a threatened species
- Of indigenous practical use or significance

To assist in garden design the booklets are further colour coded so that the gardener knows whether the plants are:

- Ground covers
- Tufted plants
- Herbs
- Creepers/climbers
- Shrubs
- Trees

There's a booklet for the coastal plant areas and a booklet for the inland plant areas of the Bellarine. Sophie handed out copies along with a mix of Bellarine grassland and wildflower seed to members who were present at the meeting. Both booklets are also available online on the <u>nursery website</u>.

# **Ground Cover**

# Distichlis distichophylla Australian Salt-grass



 Australian Salt-grass is a coarse prickly grass that can reach up to 20cm high and grows in damp salty areas, often around saltmarsh fringes.

- It has long, creeping rhizomes and leaves that are thin and rigid.
- This plant is similar in appearance to the invasive Cooch grass (Cynodon doctylon) and native Salt-couch (Sporobolus virginicus).

Flower colour: Green-straw

Flowering: October - April

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## Caladenia latifolia Pink Fairies

### Coastal Dune Scrub/Coastal Dune Grassland Mosaic Coastal Alkaline Scrub (Calcarenite Dune Woodland)

Pink Fairies are hairy pink orchids reaching up to 40cm high.

- Each plant has a single broad leaf that lies flat on the ground.
- These now rare tubers are a traditional food source for the Wadawurrung.

#### Flower colour: Pink

Flowering: September - October

EVC 858 Coastal Alkaline Scrub (Calcarenite Dune Woodland)

- Wire-leaf Mistletoe is a parasitic shrub that grows and feeds on a host tree.
  Mistletoe birds eat the white or pink berries and deposit the sticky seeds
- on a host tree. Coast Wirilda, Golden Wattle and Drooping Sheoak can often host this species on the Bellarine.
- This plant is a traditional food and medicinal resource for the Wadawurrung.
- There are several species of mistletoe on the Bellarine Peninsula.

Flower colour: Pink-white

Flowering: December - April

### EVC 858 Coastal Alkaline Scrub (Calcarenite Dune Woodland)

- Moonah is a shady tree reaching up to 10m high and 6m wide.
- In Coastal Moonah Woodlands, it provides shelter for many understory plants.
- It has creamy flower-spikes which provide nectar for birds, butterflies and moths. The seeds are contained within woody capsules that surround the stem.
- The sweet drink made from the flowers soaked in water is a traditional food source for the Wadawurrung.

Flower colour: Cream-white

Flowering: September - December

All APS Geelong Members are strongly encouraged to pay a visit to the Landcare Nursery. The nursery is open Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9-3 along with the last Sunday of the month from 10-1 and is located in <u>Drysdale</u>. PLANT TABLE - FEBRUARY

A Trachymene Caerulea or Rottnest Island Daisy was chosen as Plant of the Month. It is a short-lived (6 months) member of the carrot family that easily self seeds and germinates. It grows to around half a metre and has a pretty daisy flower.



Other featured plants included a Scaevola which was very prickly – ideal habitat for small birds, along with a beautiful Eucalyptus Landsdownia that has an open

nature and grows to about 3 metres so it's great for small gardens. A very attractive Baloskion Tetraphyllum specimen was brought in. This is lovely for anyone liking grassy plants.



Also very pretty was a Canning Cumquat Grevillea:



And a Banksia Acculeata or Prickly Banksia with a huge flower that grows quickly and produces a honey that is



a favourite with birds. It grows to 2m high by 4m wide so it needs space.
